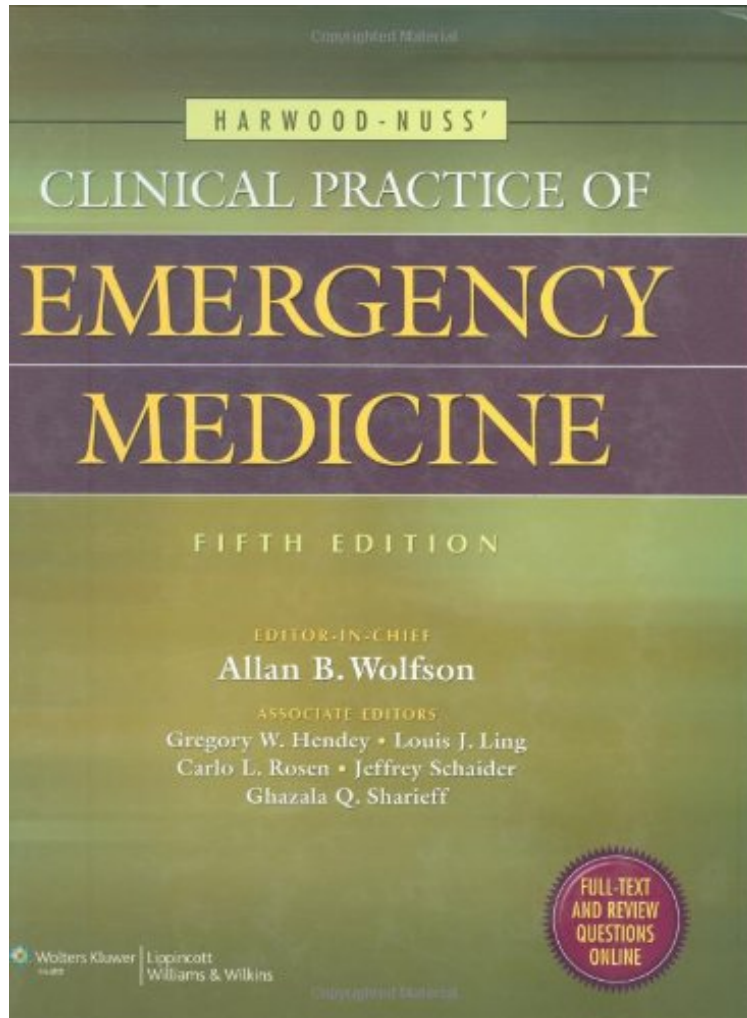

Harwood-Nuss written as an alternative to Tintinalli and now in my opinion the best reference book out there. well written like Rosens but more concise. My go-to text. By Jeremy J Voros As an Emergency Medicine resident, the textbooks are Rosen's, Tintinalli's or this, Harwood Nuss. While the other two texts focus on being the complete definitive text with comprehensive background information, HN is far more streamlined and focused on the critical key content. The organization of the chapters is more logical and conforms to my thought process as a physician in the ED rather than an academic outline. It also feels more current to me, though I might just be reflecting on the style of the prose rather than the actual content. If I'm giving a presentation I review one of the other texts.
