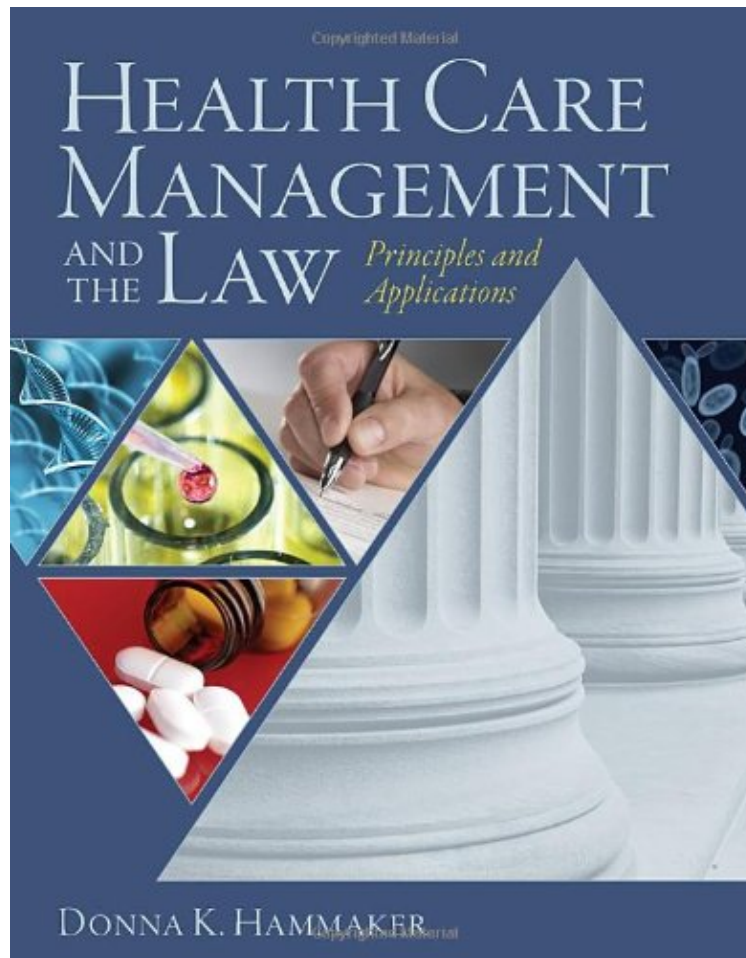


Health Care Management and the Law: Principles and Applications
