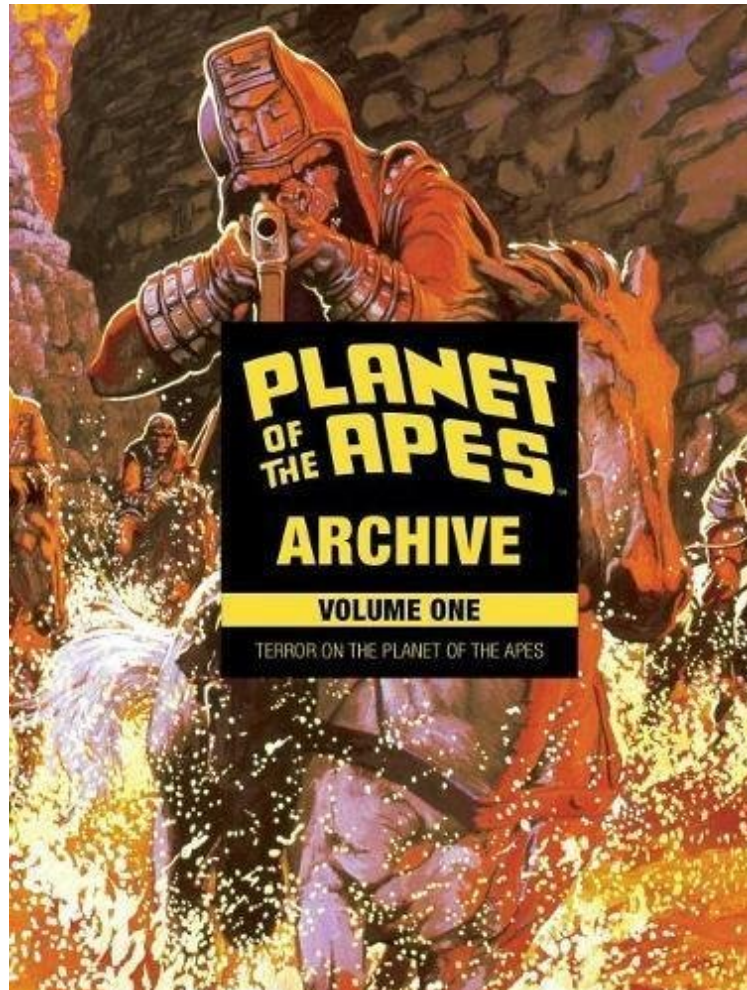

By NiTE Owl When I was a teenager back in the day _ along with walking 17 miles to school eating 12 sandwiches for lunch _ we didn't have so many internet options with which to satiate our fan-inspired afflictions. The original Ape films premiered between 1968-73 and aside from a one-shot Gold Key release, some Japanese manga nobody knew

anything about, a random fanzine article in Cinefantastique Famous Monsters of Filmland, and the Bantam/Award Books film novelizations, our options were as lifeless as *The Forbidden Zone*. Into this barren void Marvel Comics arrived in 74 with its ongoing 84page black white publication of the Planet of the Apes Magazine. For the next three years (29 issues) we funloving fans of furry were treated to allnew original content set in different timeframes, locations, and narrative conditions not limited to the first five films. *Terror on the Planet of the Apes* was the first of these noncontinuity story arcs, with others to follow (i.e. *Evolutions Nightmare*, *Kingdom on an Island*, *Quest*). And therein lies the rub with this Archive listing. The first judgement reviewed here is, I feel, accurate on most points, if not a bit harsh. To be clear; this 368page heavy HC is not an Archive of the actual MAGAZINES, but rather, the main serialized story arc that was at the heart of said publication. That mostly monthly Marvel release also included other Ape material that is not included here. All politics rightfully set aside, if youre looking for a highend complete restoration of the POTA magazines, you will be disappointed. Personally, my interest was to just revisit some classic old Mike Ploog artwork from a simpler simian time, so this BW collection _ though pricey _ was a fun nostalgic flip.
