I did note some of the problems that others have mentioned, but I'm so glad to be able to read these for myself that I can easily look past it. While it would be so nice to have a perfect version, I am happy with what I've got. These volumes are thick! They are quickly read because there's not a ton of text on the pages but you'll sit and just look at the art after you've read the words. I don't want to put any spoilers in my review so I'll just say that this one picks up right where the last one left off, where the sailors are fighting Queen Beryl. In this volume we meet Chibi Usagi and the Black Moon Clan. I love all the Serenity and Endymion art and was nearly in tears almost through the whole first half. A much more dramatic and satisfying conclusion than the television series in my opinion. About to order Volume 4! I can't wait!

The battle continues..By Rywn Sailor Moon Volume 3 finishes up the equivalent of Season 1 of the Sailor Moon anime, and beginning the next arc of the story. In Volume 3 we see the senshi use the Moon Sword for the first time, and a much more tragic telling of the battle against Queen Beryl. As the inner senshi struggle to help Sailor Moon with the battle, Usagi fights to return Mamoru to normal and bring him back to her. As a fan who had mostly only seen the anime, it's wonderful to see more of the bond between Usagi and Mamoru that is often glossed over. Sailor Moon never moves along slowly, and the final battle is no exception to the rule. NOTE: The second arc of the manga is one place where the anime starts to depart from the series, and does not contain the 'Ail Ann' storyline. The next arc soon begins and we are introduced to Chibi-Usa, and the Black Moon Clan. Peace never lasts however, and things quickly begin to fall apart for the Sailor Senshi. Fans of the use of the Japanese names will be happy to know that this has followed through to the Black Moon clan, and we see 'Demando' instead of 'Diamond' and 'Chibi-Usa' rather than 'Rini'. I was extremely happy to see the gorgeous color pages at the beginning of the volume, as these are beautifully detailed and painted. In a bit of fan-girl squeeing, I was also happy to see the use of the image showing the inner senshi paired with the four generals as well for a chapter image and use of Mamoru's actual abilities as Prince of the Earth.

When I learned of the reprint in the States, I thought "what the heck, I want to see how the real story measures up to the anime." (Which I love FYI). So I bought the Sailor V and the Sailor Moon books. I have to say, I almost love the books more than the cartoon I grew up watching. The art is amazing and the characters come over so much better in the books than they do in the show. Each character seems more real, not the over exaggerated version as in the cartoon. The romance scenes are so much more believable. As for the translation, I loved it for the most part. A few things here and there were a little confusing, but once I learned the Japanese names, I had basically no trouble at all understanding what was going on. Also, there are footnotes in the back of the book that explains any cultural references that may be confusing for westerners. I also recommend buying the Sailor V books. I loved the look into the prequel to the Sailor Moon series. It's a little rougher around the edges, but that is understandable since it was the first to be written. The artist/author had to cultivate and grow her story. It also lends a kind of insight into the newness and confusion that Sailor V was feeling when she was activated at the first sailor scout (Any hardcore fans, please forgive me for using the American translation, it's just easier for me because it's what I've known my whole life). Overall, I'm completely enamored by this series and the books can't come out fast enough for me. (No lie, I have to make myself read them slowly to extend my enjoyment and I still finished them in three sittings.)
