Just wow.By brutusmuktukBeginning with touches of Hayao Miyazaki, as a father and daughter hunt down a giant boar straight out of Princess Mononoke, Seven to Eternity captivates from start to finish. The characters, even those with extraordinary talent, are human and humble. The world is original, with mixes of frontier Western and H.P. Lovecraft-like monsters.The story mixes the rugged individualism of the Western genre, though the main character has a wife and family in this case, and the bleakness of dystopias. The comic itself reveals very little about its world, though we know at least one human character has magic powers, and the world is threatened by the mighty Mud King. In fact, Remender reveals more about his world in his explanation at the end, and part of me wishes he didn't. I like the reward of learning about it slowly as the story unravels, but perhaps I'm in the minority in that feeling.The artwork is fantastic. There are scenes that are just plain badass and some reveal

the smallness of the individual and the hopelessness and sorrow of loss. Remender is firing on all cylinders here and I'm excited to see what comes next.
